CHAPTER 1

"First Session"

Collier Z. Tratner, the patient, has his first meeting with his therapist, Caroline Black, a trainee in her rookie year of seeing patients. Collier is Caroline's first patient in her internship at Oasis Psych Clinic, County Hospital, San Francisco, CA. Collier reveals to Caroline that he is fluent in French, Spanish, German and Italian, as well as English. He grew up with a single mother, as a child of the circus. The issue of child abuse is raised but not discussed. He explains that he has run away from the circus, and is now working as waitstaff at a restaurant, temporarily living at the YMCA. Collier's favorite song is "Tight Rope," by Leon Russell. During the session, Collier is volatile — charming, angry, funny, remote, sexual.

Caroline Black: age 24, a rookie therapist, beginning her internship year of training to become a psychologist.

Collier Z. Tratner: age 21, Caroline's first patient, ran away from the circus to find himself. Collier's mother: a clown, unicyclist, contortionist on the circus team of the Club Med Resort.

What does the reader learn about Collier?

What does Caroline's style as a therapist reveal about her as a person?

What is the role of a first chapter in a novel?

From his first session, Collier sets up a situation with a clear sexual tension between him and Caroline. Since their relationship is professional, therapist and patient, sex is off limits. Why do you think Collier brings a sexual charge into the office, when a sexual relationship between them will never happen? The following essay explains why sex can never be a part of a productive therapy.

Therapy Never Includes Sex

Collier brings to his therapy an atmosphere brimming over with seduction and sex. Yet, in the context of psychotherapy, Caroline must hold a clear boundary. The point of therapy is for the patient to heal and live a full, healthy life to the best of his* ability. Important parts of a healthy life are emotions, identity, friends, home, career and sex. *Tightwire* follows one year of Collier's therapy, as he works to sort out all of these parts of his life.

So how does therapy work? How can people change just by talking to a therapist? When a patient takes unresolved feelings about an important person in his past and superimposes those feelings on the therapist, it's called *transference*. For example, if a patient had a mother who was mean to him, then he might start feeling like his therapist is being mean. This gives the patient an opportunity to fully experience a problem from the past, in the safety of the office, and gain a new understanding.

To help the patient, the therapist needs to NOT become mean like the patient's mom. Instead, the therapist needs to show the patient how he brings his relationship with his mother to other relationships, and how this causes him to recreate this unhealthy relationship again and again.

The same is true for sex. Collier has many sexual issues that he needs to sort out in therapy. From his first session, he creates an atmosphere of sexual tension. Caroline understands that part of her job is to help Collier have healthier sexual relationships in his life. She knows that if she has any sexual contact with him, it would be like a doctor forcing a patient to have sex during a physical exam. This would be a personal, emotional, physical, legal and ethical violation — which could cause her to lose her license to practice, would ruin Collier's therapy, and would damage him emotionally.

As a reader, you can watch how Collier works in therapy to develop a healthy sex life. Caroline helps him gain a healthy understanding of his own behavior, and develop a new approach to his own sexuality. In order to do this, she will not have sex with him, no matter how seductive he becomes.

*Because of the genders of the patient and therapist in *Tightwire*, I refer to the patient as "he", and the therapist as "she". However, any gender can apply to either role.

CHAPTER 2 "A Healthy Baby Girl"

Caroline is born. Her parents, Leah and Geoff, insist on a natural childbirth, going against the hospital's policy in 1958. Two nurses, Rose and Deborah, step in as midwives. Caroline is born in the hallway of the maternity ward, behind a heap of laundry. We find out that Leah attended Radcliffe College and UCLA medical school, where she was one of two women in her class, and graduated #3. Geoff attended Harvard College, where he played football.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

Caroline won't remember the day she was born, but the personality traits that Leah and Geoff bring forward in this chapter will be important parts of Caroline's upbringing. If you look back on Caroline's first session with Collier, can you find places where Caroline might have integrated her parents' character traits into her own personality, and into her professional work as a therapist?

Do you think the personalities of your family members have influenced you? Why or why not?

How would you describe the tone of Collier's sessions with Caroline? (Caroline tries to hold steady in the face of Collier's mercurial moods.)

CHAPTER 3

"Maurice"

Caroline sets up an appointment with her supervisor, Dr. Laura Stilwell. Along with Collier, Caroline has seen two other patients: Gigi, an adolescent whose best friend was killed in a drive by shooting – Dr. R., a female chemistry professor, who builds music stands as a hobby and is extremely intellectual. Collier tells Caroline about his circus act on the trapeze with Maurice. They begin to speak about Maurice and how confused Collier was (and still is) about the sexualized tone of the act.

Dr. R.: new character, Caroline's patient, extremely intellectual.

Collier's mother: new character, on the Club Med circus team with Collier.

Gregory: new character, on the Club Med circus team with Collier. Wanda: new character, on the Club Med circus team with Collier.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

How would you describe Collier's background from the perspective of abuse? Caroline finds words to begin to address Collier's confusion about what happened to him, and the ambiguity about whether he was physically abused, emotionally abused, or both. Do you think Collier was abused as a child?

("Child Abuse" and "Sexual Abuse" are catch-all phrases, which cover a variety of circumstances. Many situations which clinicians would call "abusive" fall outside of the category of "legal abuse." This can lead to confusion in sorting out the resulting feelings, and in healing. If this chapter brings up something in the reader's past that feels confusing or abusive, please reach out to a therapist for the support you deserve.)

CHAPTER 4

"Everyone Does It"

Leah and Geoff return from a 5-day vacation. Rose (one of Leah's labor nurses) and Ted (Rose's husband) have taken care of Caroline (age 2) and her brother Derrick (age 5) while their parents were away. When Leah and Geoff return, Caroline is speaking in full sentences. She has been throwing tantrums.

Derrick: new character. Caroline's older brother.

Leah Geoff

Rose: one of Leah's labor nurses, a family friend. Ted: Rose's husband, a high school English teacher.

VOCABULARY

Structure of a novel (alternating chapters between Collier's therapy and Caroline's growing up)

Use of humor (including the chapter's title) Background

Two Protagonists (Caroline and Collier)

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

What is your opinion on the structure of the novel? Do you think the author made a good choice to structure her story in this way? Why or why not?

In some ways, Caroline is precocious; in other ways, is she very much her age. Describe both types of character traits in Caroline.

Even as a young child, Caroline begins to show qualities which will contribute to her being a gifted therapist. Can you pick out these qualities? (Her gift with words is the quality shown in this chapter.)

What do you think of the author's choice to write a novel with two protagonists?

CHAPTER 5

"Dr. Stilwell And Mandy"

Caroline has her first meeting with Dr. Stilwell, her supervisor. As Caroline's supervisor, Dr. Stilwell will be Caroline's teacher and guide through her first year as a therapist.

To Collier's intense surprise and discomfort, he cries in his session as he describes his relationship with Mandy, and his leaving her without saying goodbye.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

Have you ever had a great teacher? (This can be someone in a classroom, or in a completely different setting like an aunt who teaches you to cook, a sister who teaches you to throw a ball, or an uncle who teaches you swing dancing.) What qualities made your teacher great?

What are the qualities that make a great teacher? Do you think Dr. Stilwell has those qualities? Does Dr. Stilwell do a good job in her first meeting with Caroline? Why or why not?

Collier and Caroline are both extremely surprised when Collier cries in this session. What do you notice about the way Collier cries? What does this reveal about Collier? (People have different styles of crying. Each person has a relationship to their own tears.)

CHAPTER 6

"Artistic Vision"

Caroline overhears her father (Geoff) when he loses his temper on the phone, speaking to a movie director. Caroline throws a tantrum.

Character development: Caroline (intuition) and Geoff (anger)

Character Interaction: Caroline and Geoff

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

This is the first of several chapters dealing with Caroline's intuition. How does her intuition relate to her tantrums?

Caroline's gift of intuition is also a burden. Can you think of another example of a gift that is also a burden?

CHAPTER 7

"Hairballs And Hope"

Dr. Stilwell helps Caroline understand the power of hope, and the need to keep the office safe in a way that surprises Caroline (safe for Collier's vomiting). Dr. R's favorite movie is *The Wizard Of Oz.* Gigi is still not speaking in therapy, but is starting to connect with Caroline through playing the game Hangman.

Collier rents a basement apartment from a lesbian couple, Jeanne and Tracy. Jeanne and Tracy have two children, Heather (age 6) and Henry (age 9).

Jeanne and Tracy: new characters, Collier rents their basement apartment. They will become role-model-parents to Collier.

Heather and Henry: new characters, ages 6 and 9, Jeanne and Tracy's children.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

As the book opens, Collier feels hopeless. How do you think *hope* paves the way for healthy change in a person's life? Do you think healthy change can lead to healing?

From the story so far, which qualities in Collier do you think will contribute to his hopelessness? Which qualities have the potential to help him heal?

CHAPTER 8

"Tea Party"

Leah tells Caroline important pieces of her family history. Caroline becomes overwhelmed when she senses her mother's emotions, and throws a tantrum. Leah doesn't understand the extent of her daughter's intuition.

Textual Evidence

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

This chapter is revealing not only about Caroline and Leah as individuals, but also about their relationship. What does this chapter reveal about their relationship?

When a child throws a tantrum, people generally react negatively. Do you find yourself reacting negatively to Caroline, or do you feel empathic when she throws a tantrum?

This chapter deals with the relationship between Caroline's tantrums and her intuition. Cite textual evidence to explain how her tantrums relate to her intuition. (She feels overwhelmed by her intuition, then she throws a tantrum).

CHAPTER 9

"Lorna"

Caroline is learning the basics of becoming a therapist. Dr. Stilwell guides Caroline on how to use countertransference to help her patient. She tells Caroline that therapy takes place in the preconscious. Gigi has begun to speak in her therapy sessions.

Collier brings his sexual history into his treatment, both through his words, and through the transference. He talks about masturbating until he hurts himself.

What is your personal reaction to Lorna? Do you find her interesting? If she were a "real" person, would you want to get to know her?

What qualities draw Collier to Lorna? Why is he afraid to connect to her?

CHAPTER 10

"Autograph"

Leah and Geoff meet with Terra, Caroline's kindergarten teacher. Terra is concerned that Caroline is too academic, not artistic enough. Terra asks for Geoff's autograph, which infuriates Leah.

CHARACTERS

Geoff

Terra: new character, Caroline's kindergarten teacher (minor character; this is her only appearance in the novel).

Marsha: new character, Caroline's best friend.

VOCABULARY

Character Development Character Interaction Minor Character

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

This chapter is about Geoff and Leah as individuals, and about their relationship as a couple? What do you learn about them as individuals? (They are both narcissistic.) What do you learn about them as a couple?

In this chapter, if you were a friend of Caroline's parents, who would you feel more empathic towards in this situation – Leah, Geoff, both, neither?

Why does the author bring Terra into the story? What is Terra's role in this chapter? (She brings into the light aspects of Leah, of Geoff, and of their relationship.)

CHAPTER 11

"Hopeless Case"

Caroline tells Dr. Stilwell that she doesn't feel lost all the time in sessions anymore. Dr. R. talks about the misogyny she deals with in her chemistry department.

Collier called his mother who is furious at him for abandoning her. He described how he always loved to read, but his mother gave him no support for his intellect. Mandy eloped with one of the Club Med guests and is married.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

Therapists are human and mistakes are a part of every treatment. Handling mistakes productively is important and in this session, Caroline misses a crucial moment. Can you find Caroline's mistake? How does she miss an opportunity to pick up on Collier's issues?

Chapters in *Tightwire* often end with an insight or a twist. Do you find the end of the chapters interesting or not? Does the ending of each chapter motivate you to read the next chapter? Why or why not?

How would you describe Collier's mother and her character? (Narcissistic)

CHAPTER 12

"Cinderella Needs Analysis"

Caroline goes to Marsha's birthday party and one of the mothers tells Caroline that she is overweight (she isn't). Caroline and Marsha are both growing up in film industry families, and neither wants to be an actor. At the party, they saw the animated movie *Cinderella*. Caroline tells Leah that the movie doesn't make sense because after her traumatic childhood, Cinderella doesn't need a prince to make her happy; she needs analysis.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

Think about Cinderella's story: the death of her mother, followed by the death of her father, followed by abuse and enslavement by a new family...and then catapulted into "Happily Ever After" by a pumpkin carriage and a glass slipper. Of course, with her background, Cinderella's happily-ever-after-ending is as realistic as a pumpkin's turning into a frilly,

sparkly carriage. Why do you think the "happily ever after" fairy tale approach to life doesn't actually work?

What does Caroline's reaction to *Cinderella* reveal about her character?

This chapter deals with tone (another parent telling Caroline she's fat), subplot (growing up in the film industry) and theme (attitudes in the film industry). Pick one of these topics and cite textual evidence from this chapter.

Chapter 13

"A Name Without An Identity"

Dr. Stilwell tells Caroline that she is earning a strong reputation in her training program. Caroline figured out the meaning of a series of drawings from a young child. Caroline becomes anxious, feeling like people have high expectations that she can't meet. Dr. Stilwell suggests that she might want to pursue her own therapy, and Caroline is completely taken aback.

Collier is extremely upset that Mandy is married. Collier realizes that both he and Mandy needed a way out of the circus, and both of them leaped when an opportunity presented itself. He's worried about her, and about himself. He describes himself as having a name without an identity.

The chapter's title not only guides the reader in understanding this chapter, but also highlights a theme in the novel. Do you like the title of this chapter? Why or why not?

At this point, you have read approximately ¼ of the novel. Do you identify with any character in the story? Why or why not?

What does Caroline's meeting with Dr. Stilwell reveal about Caroline? Cite evidence from the text.

This is the first time Collier refers to a previous session in his therapy. Until this point, he treats each session like a separate entity from every other session. Why do you think this is important? (Collier is developing a new sense of continuity in his own life. This is reflected in his therapy sessions, which are starting to fit together in his mind, helping him make sense of his own emotions.)

CHAPTER 14

"Haircut"

Caroline gives her Barbie Doll a haircut so she'll look "more real." More information about Leah's background and Geoff's background is revealed. Leah realizes that Caroline remembers everything people say, word for word.

Character Development (Caroline likes things which are "more real"; Caroline is extremely perceptive about her parents, and she is beginning to have words to help her structure her own ideas.)

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

This chapter reveals Caroline's character, Leah's character, and their relationship. What is revealed in this chapter?

Regarding her doll, Caroline says, "She'll look prettier when she's more real." What does this tell you about Caroline's character? How do you imagine this attitude will influence Caroline as she grows up in a film industry family?

What are your thoughts on the way this chapter ends? (Children usually believe that their experience is everyone's experience. Caroline is completely surprised by the idea that not everyone remembers conversations, verbatim, for years. This self-referenced approach to the world, assuming everyone is like you, is completely normal in child development.)

What is the purpose of a minor character? Use Millie Charlemagne as an example.

"Signature"

Caroline is impatient for Collier to have more insights, and Dr. Stilwell encourages her to slow down. Gigi is making progress in her therapy.

Collier gets back in touch with Lorna after cancelling their date. Lorna makes metal sculptures and plans to go to medical school.

Think about a quality of yours that is important to your identity. What makes this quality important to you?

CHAPTER 16

"Profiteroles"

Leah and Geoff give a dinner party, and one of their guests reveals confidential information about a patient. In reaction, Caroline begins to shake uncontrollably.

Geoff

Caroline

Dr. and Mrs. Koslucher: new characters, therapists who cross ethical lines revealing confidential information.

Deborah and Steve: (Leah's labor nurse and her husband)

Rose and Ted (Leah's labor nurse and her husband)

Hadley Lindquist: new character, actor. Maia Pompelli: new character, actor.

VOCABULARY

Background: shows how the film industry influences Caroline's values as she grows. Character Interaction: shows how Caroline and Derrick bond.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

The reader knows that Caroline will grow up to become a therapist. In this chapter, we meet a therapist who acts in an extremely unethical way. What does Dr. Koslucher say that is a breach of ethics? (Therapists should never discuss a patient by name, or give identifying information, because this violates confidentiality.)

Do you agree with how Leah and Geoff handled their dinner party? Why or why not?

CHAPTER 17

"Tears For Zeus"

Collier attends a concert at a church with a discussion afterwards. He realizes he doesn't know his religious heritage, and calls his mother to ask (father Presbyterian, mother Protestant). He tells Caroline that his mother joined the circus at age sixteen after both of her parents died. Collier feels the emotional impact of knowing that his mother didn't cry when her parents died, but was inconsolable when Zeus (her dog) died when Collier was a child.

Dr. Stilwell and Caroline talk about Collier's living in the moment, trying to detach himself from a sense of continuity, disconnected from his past and not thinking about his future.

This chapter addresses an important relationship: Collier's relationship to his own tears. Do you think being able to cry is important? Why or why not?

How would you describe Collier's mother and her character traits?

"Madeleine"

Caroline attends an entertainment industry party with her parents and brother, Derrick. Caroline and Derrick walk into a room with a group of adults having sex.

Dolly Bracker: new character, financing Geoff's project.

Beau: new character, Dolly's boyfriend.

Madeleine: new character, Dolly's daughter, age 11.

Sexual trauma in childhood can take many forms. Do you think this chapter describes a type of sexual trauma or sexual abuse? Why or why not? What happens in this chapter that Caroline experiences as sexual trauma?

Although Madeleine is a minor character, she is extremely complex. How is she complex? Cite textual evidence. Compare Madeleine's character to Bronze's character (another minor character who is much more one-dimensional.)

CHAPTER 19

"Halloween"

In supervision, Caroline discusses the different styles of speech in her patients. Dr. R. loses her temper with her colleagues.

Collier attends a school pageant with Jeanne and Tracy. He is upset by some of the costumes. Collier is developing a stronger relationship with Jeanne and Tracy.

What does the reader learn about Collier in this chapter? (He is angry when he comes across homophobia; he feels extremely vulnerable, but keeps it hidden.)

How would you describe the author's style of writing? Do you like her style? Why or why not?

CHAPTER 20

"It's All In The Notebooks"

Leah's mother (Caroline's Grandma Ruth) has died. Leah, Geoff, Caroline and Derrick are packing up her belongings. Caroline figures out that Leah's mother was dyslexic. The reader learns the story of Grandma Ruth and the Academy Awards, as well as more family history about Leah's parents (Ruth and Sam).

What does Caroline figure out about her grandmother? What does the reader learn about Caroline's style of thinking? Why do you think Caroline is so drawn to reading about Sherlock Holmes (a fictional detective)?

CHAPTER 21

"Tomato Wedges And Barf"

Caroline talks to Dr. Stilwell about Collier's new ability to feel anger without becoming consumed by anger. Caroline realizes that Collier is a great teacher.

Collier babysits for Heather and Henry, who become ill with the stomach flu. For the first time, Collier can imagine being a father. Jeanne and Tracy are becoming role model parents for Collier.

At the end of this chapter, Collier tells Caroline that he can imagine being a father. What happens in this chapter that serves as a catalyst for this chapte in Collier?

CHAPTER 22

"Empathy And Boundaries"

Caroline and her family are in Rome for the summer, on location with Geoff who is filming a movie. Caroline is extremely upset by the way other families at their hotel treat each other.

Caroline is startled when her mother tells her that feeling both empathy and boundaries, experienced simultaneously, are essential components of being a therapist. Caroline decides to become a psychologist when she grows up.

Caroline and Madeleine have become friends. Caroline has received her masters degree, and will begin seeing her first patient (Collier). Caroline asks Madeleine to recommend a therapist.

Theme: the value of a good psychotherapy (fighting the stigma).

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

People have all sorts of ideas about therapy and therapists, and their ideas sometimes include a stigma. Even though she's a therapist, Caroline herself is extremely anxious about being a patient. I hope this novel shows how helpful a "talking therapy" can be, and helps to diminish the stigma.

In your view, does psychotherapy include a stigma? Does mental illness include a stigma? Why or why not?

Did the novel influence your view of psychotherapy?

Why is Caroline so anxious about starting her own therapy? (Think about her experiences with therapists as she grew up.)

"A Window And A Skylight"

Dr. Stilwell welcomes Caroline into the field, and refers her first private case.

Collier and Caroline talk about how far he has come in his therapy, and that he will continue treatment in her private practice.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

The title of this chapter is a metaphor. Caroline's new office has a window and a skylight, but these words symbolize much more. What do the words symbolize? (Letting in the light.)

Why is it so meaningful at the end of the chapter when Collier tells Caroline that she is hired?

"Another First Session".

Caroline begins her own therapy with a psychiatrist, Clay Gittleman.

DISCUSSION/WRITING TOPICS

During my 20+ years as a therapist, before I began writing novels, I was always fascinated by first sessions. In the initial fifty minutes, patients make several choices, both conscious and unconscious – what to say, how to say it, in what order, tone of voice, facial expression, physical appearance, body language. Choose three meaningful moments in Caroline's first session with her new therapist. Why are these moments important?

Did you like *Tightwire*? Why or why not?

Now that you know Collier's story through his first year in therapy, go back to the first chapter. What can you now understand about that first session? (Think about his fear, his anger, his sexualizing his relationship with Caroline.)

ASSIGNMENTS AND QUESTIONS

- Keep a journal, written from Collier's perspective or Caroline's perspective.
- Design an alternative cover for *Tightwire*.
- Write the book's next chapter -- Collier's first session with Caroline in her new office.
- What was your favorite/least favorite part of *Tightwire*?
- If you could have lunch with any character in the book, who would you choose?
- Choose a theme from *Tightwire*. Write a poem about the theme.
- Write a blog post from a character's point of view.
- Take a chapter from *Tightwire* and rewrite it as a play. Perform your one act play for the class.
- Write a song about *Tightwire*. Perform your song for the class.
- Write a book review of *Tightwire*.
- Write a character analysis of either Caroline or Collier. Track their development as the story unfolds. How do they influence each other's growth?
- For a novel to work well, the writer needs to evoke feelings in the reader. Did *Tightwire* evoke feelings in you? What did you feel?
- Write a critique of *Tightwire*. Did parts of the story make you angry? Did you disagree with the messages conveyed? Did you dislike the author's style?
- Is there a passage or chapter in the novel that caught your attention? Analyze this portion of the book, in the larger context of the story. Why did you have such a strong reaction to this particular section?
- Analyze a quote or portion of dialogue. What is the significance of this section in the larger story? Why did you have a strong reaction to this quote?
- The author structured *Tightwire* with chapters alternating between Collier's therapy sessions with Caroline, and Caroline's growing up. A large proportion of the novel is comprised of dialogue. What is your opinion on the author's choice to structure her book in this way?
